

Welcome to this special celebration of Christmas in words and music, organised by the Civil Service Choir. We particularly welcome colleagues from the Christians in Government networks in the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG); Department for Transport (DfT); Home Office; and the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra).

This is the 34th annual staff Carol Service to be held at St Stephen's. We should like to express our gratitude to Revd. Graham Buckle for allowing us to use this fine church once again. We are also excited to be returning here on Thursday evening with our chamber choir's *A Christmas Tapestry* concert, exploring Christmas music through the ages and featuring two fascinating masses that are effectively carol medleys.

The Civil Service Choir brings together staff from almost all Government Departments and agencies in Westminster. The choir has a membership of over 200 singers and today's service is the choir's 207th performance since it gave its first concert here in St Stephen's in November 2009 with 25 singers. The choir is supported by SPARTA – the Sports and Recreational Association of the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government and the Department for Transport – and by CSSC Sports and Leisure.

2025 has been another busy year for the choir. We were incredibly honoured to sing at Buckingham Palace in February for a reception hosted by His Majesty the King to celebrate the Civil Service. In March we performed Mozart's *Requiem* in Smith Square Hall, with the Brandenburg Sinfonia. Two weeks later we were back performing as part of Sinfonia Smith Square's Easter Festival. We were back there again in the summer trading major classical works for swing classics, performing our *Celebration in Swing* concert, with a professional jazz orchestra. November brought perhaps our biggest highlight of the year – Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana* and Rutter's *Feel the Spirit* in collaboration with the Whitehall Orchestra and children's Chorus Angelicus at Holy Trinity Sloane Square. Having sold out two weeks before the concert, we were thrilled by the standing ovation at the end. December is always busy, with today being in the middle of a run of six performances in ten days.

The choir is directed by Stephen Hall OBE. Today's organist is Matthew Warbis.


